PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome Delegates of the 2016 National SUSK Congress!

On behalf of the National SUSK Executive, I would like to welcome you to SUSKatoon, Saskatchewan, home to many small Ukrainian towns and open prairies as far as the eye can see.

The 2015-2016 year has brought many different challenges and opportunities to not only the Ukrainian Canadian student community, but also to the broader Ukrainian Canadian community, as well as our homeland of Ukraine.

Looking Back

Over the last year, our Executive reflected on what SUSK has done since its founding in 1953. We started a few different projects this year that tie into our history, starting off with "Alumni in the News", where we took our list of past alumni and tried our best to get to know them a little better. Everything from LinkedIn pages to corporate websites, we tried to learn as much as we could in order to expand our alumni engagement. Secondly, we wanted to continue to build on our "Student" digitization project. "Student/CTYJQEHT" was first published in the late 1960's and continues on today, and all issues, past and present, have been digitized online at student.susk.ca. After digitization, we wanted to know what the articles were in all of these issues along with who wrote them, so we set off to read through all of the past issues and label each one. Many names were recognized throughout both projects, and some articles are still applicable to students of today!

I also wanted to personally thank Bohdan Kupych, a SUSK alumnus and a past editor of "Student", who donated a vinyl that our entire SUSK Executive didn't even know existed. In the 1970's, SUSK produced a vinyl called "Banned in the USSR" featuring Kobza. We gladly accepted the vinyl, digitized it, and uploaded it to Spotify, iTunes, Amazon, and many other online distribution sites! Search up "Banned in the USSR" on your favourite streaming or music program and have a listen!

Ukraine

Since the Revolution of Dignity, SUSK has been vocal on a variety of issues in Ukraine and has supported various petitions, campaigns, and causes. Member organizations of SUSK have raised tens of thousands of dollars in support of Ukraine and continue to do so wherever possible. In September 2015 and in April 2016, SUSK had the pleasure of meeting the Ambassador from Ukraine to Canada, His Excellency Andriy Shevchenko. Ambassador Shevchenko spoke at length about the possibilities for Canada and Ukraine that not only include humanitarian aid, but also support in economic, cultural, and financial sectors. SUSK looks forward to working with Ambassador Shevchenko, the Ukrainian Canadian Congress, and the Canadian Government to continue to support Ukraine during such difficult times.



PRESIDENT'S REPORT

UCC Dragons Competition

Since the 2013 Triennial Congress of the Ukrainian Canadian Congress (UCC), SUSK has worked hard to fully implement our proposal from the UCC Dragons Competition. In 2014-2015, almost a dozen Ukrainian Student Organizations (USO) hosted networking events across the country. In 2015-2016, we launched the USO Project Fund, which helps clubs put on all kinds of different events. Some key highlights included McGill's Christmas fashion show, Ryerson's Holodomor Awareness week, University of Saskatchewan's Pysanka workshop, and University of Toronto at Mississauga's Varenyky night. We hope to continue to sustain and grow the USO Project Fund for the upcoming year. This year also brought the development of the USO Best Practices Toolkit, a resource that will help clubs with starting new events, fundraising, growing membership, and more.

Communication

In the early fall of 2015, SUSK transitioned to a digital newsletter service to better communicate to its members, past and present, about all things SUSK. As SUSK's communication tools are almost exclusively online, we have worked on extending the reach of our Facebook and Twitter accounts, expanding our Wikipedia page, and launching an Instagram account, all of which have been growing at a rapid pace. SUSK also produced an infographic to explain what SUSK's role in the community is, what it provides to student clubs, and a few examples of what SUSK does each year. In addition, SUSK released an updated Position Paper, outlining where our organization stands on key issues relevant to Ukrainian Canadian students.

In more traditional communication fashion, we continued to sell and distribute Stop Putin! stickers through the SUSK website. Our stickers have been plastered around the world, on many MacBooks, bumpers, and university campuses. In addition, we continue to publish several issues of the official SUSK Newspaper, "Student". We released four regular issues along with a special Congress Edition this term, and I want to personally thank every individual who contributed. "Student" is a very important part of SUSK and many alumni fondly remember either writing for "Student" or being on the production team back when it was in paper form. I'm happy to see this tradition live on and I encourage all Ukrainian Canadian students to contribute their work and have their voice heard.

SUSK Congress

In fall 2014, I visited the University of Saskatchewan Ukrainian Students' Association (USUSA) as Vice-President with then President, Christine Czoli. It was fantastic to see all of the work the USUSA was doing and we knew that going forward, we needed to host a Congress in Saskatoon following a 25-year hiatus. After a very successful 2015 Congress in Montreal, we decided to go ahead and host SUSKatoon 2016! Thank you to all of the students at USUSA for making your club what it is today and being the host USO for this year's Congress.

Lastly, I would like to thank my Executive team that I have had the pleasure of working with over the last year. Although we only really meet in person once or twice a year, we can accomplish an extraordinary amount of work in such a short period of time using online communication tools. Andriy, Anastasia, Borys, Alex, Andrea (Dica), Darya (Dasha), Anton, Kateryna, Inga, Connor, Nadia, and Christine (Xrystia) - thank you for making this year exceptional and I wish you all the best with whatever comes after SUSKatoon (including another possible year on the Executive!).

Andrea Chalupa

Andrea Chalupa is a journalist and the author of Orwell and The Refugees: The Untold Story of Animal Farm. She has written for TIME, The Atlantic, The Daily Beast, and Forbes. Some of the institutions where she has spoken include Columbia University, McGill University, and the National Press Club in Washington, DC. She is a founder of DigitalMaidan, an online movement that made the Ukrainian protests the #I trending topic on Twitter worldwide at a time when the mainstream media was obsessing over Justin Bieber's arrest in Miami. Her first screenplay, about the intrepid, young Welsh journalist Gareth Jones helping inspire George Orwell's Animal Farm, the book that made him famous, is in development in Europe.

Darya Naumova

Born and raised in Ukraine, Darya moved to Canada to study neuroscience at McGill University. She is currently working towards a Master in Human Genetics, completing a thesis on genetics of psychiatric disorders. In Darya's university career one theme remained unchanged, her involvement in the Ukrainian community. A devoted member of McGill Ukrainian Students' Association (MUSA) since 2011, Darya has served as MUSA president in 2013-2014 academic year, leading student involvements in Montreal movements in support of Maidan. Iryna holds Master's Degrees in Linguistics and in Marketing, a diploma in Business Administration from Grant MacEwan University, as well as an Immigration Consultant Diploma from Ashton College. Iryna is a member of Immigration Consultants of Canada Regulatory Council (ICCRC) and Canadian Association of Professional Immigration Consultants (CAPIC). Having many years of experience in executive role, Iryna co-founded a Ukraine-inspired clothing company based in Saskatoon in 2015. Iryna emigrated from Ukraine to Canada in 2011. She is a proud member of the Canadian Ukrainian community holding board positons with the UCC Saskatchewan Provincial Council as a Director at Large, UCC – Saskatoon Branch Board, Ukrainian Day in the Park Festival, and Stream of Hope (a non-for-profit organization helping disadvantaged children in Ukraine).

Ryan Boyko

A frequent emcee to the Toronto Ukrainian Festival, Ryan Boyko is no stranger to the Ukrainian community. Ryan is a devoted actor/ director/producer/writer, Ryan has had the pleasure of performing for audiences across Canada in many wonderful theatres from Ottawa's National Arts Centre, to The Shakespeare on the Saskatchewan Festival. Ryan was a company member of the renowned Stratford Shakespeare Festival of Canada for two seasons. He also appeared in the world premier of Sky Gilbert's "Ladylike".

Ryan's biggest upcoming project is the Enemy Aliens event, featuring a historian-approved film script that we're working on and we're currently trying to raise an additional \$35,000 for our development. We have \$I40,000 that will be topping off that \$35,000 through the Canadian First World War Internment Recognition Fund. Enemy Aliens will either be developed into a feature FIIm or TV series.

Additionally, Ryan is in the process of creating a three-part documentary series on the War Measures Act: Part I dealing with the internment of Ukrainians and other eastern Europeans during World War I, part II dealing with the Japanese and Italian internment during World War 2, and the third part regarding the 1970's Quebec crisis.

As an entrepreneur, Roma was the owner of a niche market Display and Tradeshow Company serving clients throughout North America for over 30 years with award winning displays. While leading her display company, Roma was the Project Manager with Deprenyl Research Limited and later the Executive Office Director for a start-up nutraceutical company. Roma Dzerowicz was an active member of Plast, the Ukrainian Youth Organization, where she guided several troupes of young ladies to become competent responsible and valuable citizens throughout the Toronto Ukrainian community. Today she is an active member of UWOC (OYK) Toronto, a branch of the Ukrainian National Federation.

Radomir

Bilash SUSK alumnist and 5th generation Ukrainian Canadian, Radomir Bilash was born and raised in Winnipeg, where he graduated from senior Ukrainian Studies classes ("kursy") at the Ukrainian Reading Association hall. He was editor of Smoloskyp Ukrainian Students' newspaper at St. John's High School, and later a member of the Alpha Omega Ukrainian Students' Society Executive and Obnova Students Club member at the University of Manitoba, while obtaining Bachelors and Master degrees in Cultural Anthropology with a minor in Ukrainian Studies. Passionate in his heritage, he has always worked with any museum that offers Ukrainian themes, authored numerous articles and presentations pertaining to Ukrainian-Canadian Culture, has been an Adjunct Associate Professor and lecturer in the Department of Modern Languages and Cultural Studies at the University of Alberta, and for the past 20+ years presented a course in Early Ukrainian-Canadian Culture there. He is committed to the Ukrainian community, and is currently the National Historian for the Ukrainian Canadian Congress, Project Manager of the Alberta-Ukraine Genealogical Project, and consultant to the St. Onufrius Ukrainian Catholic Church relocation project, Canadian Museum of History.

VESNA FESTIVAL

Saturday, May 7th, 2016 6:00 PM-1:00 AM

Vesna owes much of its birth to the social climate of the early 1970s. In response to demonstrations opposing the notion of biculturalism, Prime Minister Trudeau announced Canada's Multiculturalism, ethnic groups attained a sense of validation in the 'New Canada.' Multiculturalism was a very significant movement for Canada's Ukrainians. It swerved to reverse repressive second language laws allowing for instruction in schools; today our children are able to attend the Bishop Filevech Ukrainian Bilingual School. Saskatchewan was the first province to implement multiculturalism which served as a catalyst for cultural celebrations, such as Vesna, promoting, sharing and preserving and engendering pride in Ukrainian culture for today's and future generations.

Prior to Vesna Festival, maintaining Ukrainian culture remained centred around local churches and halls. Dance and youth groups served to preserve important aspects of the culture, while church services used Ukrainian language almost exclusively. During the new and exciting time of multiculturalism, individuals from the Ukrainian community wished to share their colourful culture. Al Kachkowski, who at the time worked at the Mohyla Institute, prompted fellow Ukrainian and good friend Yurko Foty to use his influence at the University of Saskatchewan to promote Ukrainian culture. Yurko's idea was to create a festival based on a Ukrainian wedding theme showcasing Ukrainian traditions and culture. Yurko and Al, along with friends and family, further developed the idea into a festival theme, where history and culture could be presented in a party atmosphere - Vesna was born!

Through the Ukrainian community, Al and Yurko recruited volunteers and invited people to become involved with the festival: Zenon Pohoresky created the original logo, Linda Lazarowich former director of the Ukrainian Museum, and Judy-Anne Chabun were some of the people who helped bring the first Vesna to life. This spirit of volunteerism is what makes Vesna successful today.

The first Vesna was held on May 3I, 1974 at the Centennial Auditorium, now known as TCU Place. The newly implemented multiculturalism legislation allowed Vesna Festival to obtain federal and provincial funding. In addition to government funding, Vesna was sponsored by the Ukrainian Self-Reliance League, and i later years also by Saskatoon's Ukrainian Professional and Business Club. In the years following the first Vesna, the festival formed its own Board of Directors and is now a non-profit organization and registered charity.

Over the past 40 years, the mission of Vesna has remained constant; to provide a top-quality event displaying Ukrainian entertainment and culture as an integral part of the Saskatchewan community. Vesna Festival is and always has been a family affair; a third generation is now involved and performing at Vesna. Following the success of the first Vesna, organizers had greater plans and visions. Past Board members plus countless volunteers have shaped Vesna Festival to the wonderful celebration it is today.

Vesna Festival 2016 "Sharing Your Stories of Our Ukrainian Canadian Journey"

The story of Ukrainian immigration began in 1891 to Canada. Come follow the journey of our Ukrainian Canadian story woven in dance, song and music on Vesna's main stage entertainment which begins with our ancestors departure from Ukraine, our vibrant community of today to our promising future. Vesna port of entry opens at 5:00 pm. Pre-story entertainment begins at 5:20. Program launch is at 6:00 pm. Come dressed in period attire from the last 125 years. Be a part of the Story!

Rules of Order

As per section VIII.4.a of the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union Constitution;

At the outset of the Congress, The President, or the Vice-President, or designate when the President is not available shall chair the election from among Delegates:

a. Presidium, composed of a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson and two (2) Secretaries;

i. The Presidium is responsible to conduct the Congress proceedings;

RIGHTS & RESPONSIBILITIES of the CHAIR

I. Conduct sessions of the LII Congress in accordance with the adopted program, maintain order and adhere to the Rules of Order outline in the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union Constitution

- 2. Facilitate discussion and ensure its viability
- 3. Put all motions to a vote and announce the results
- 4. Explain and decide all questions of order
- 5. Immediately suspend discussion by a delegate when;
 - He/She interferes with the proceedings of the Congress or is off topic being discussed;
 - A motion is made on a point of order;
 - An objection to the consideration of a motion is made
- 6. Dismiss irrelevant or late motions
- 7. Conduct sessions fairly and impartially
- 8. The Vice-Chair, who conducts Congress business in the absence of the Chair, is accorded the same rights as the chair.

RIGHTS of the DELEGATE

I. Express opinions relevant to issues place on the agenda and formulate them into concise conclusions

2. Put forth before the Congress proposals and motions for approval

3. Take part in the Congress Committee's, discuss and approve proposed resolutions at the Committees and vote on them during the appropriated times.

4. Have voting privileges as defined by the Ukrainian Canadian Students' Union Constitution

GENERAL RULES of ORDER

I. Question to members of the outgoing Executive be directed to the Chair

2. During discussion of reports each person may speak only once to summarize his remarks regarding the activities of the outgoing Executive. Comments already made by other persons should not be restated.

3. Each person who proposes an amendment to a motion by adding to, deleting from the question or rephrasing should be immediately provided to the Congress Resolutions Committee with their proposal in writing.

4. A motion, once it is moved, seconded and interpreted by the Chair may be withdrawn by the mover only with the consent of the seconder.

5. All points of order should be directed to the Chair by a motion. A motion concerning a point of order may be made under the following circumstances;

- Where there is concern about the running of business by the Chair
- When Delegates use improper or derogatory comments
- When a speaker does not speak to the issue or takes excessive time in debate

A point of order must be made immediately and stated concisely; A point of order;

- Supersedes all other debate and may interrupt the speaker
- Does not require a seconder
- Must be resolved by the Chair immediately
- May be appealed to the Congress immediately after the ruling of the Chair

6. All procedural matters, which are not addressed by the Rules of Order of the Congress, shall be go erned by to Robert's Rules of Order, insofar as they do not contradict the Ukrainian Canadian Student's Union Constitution

VOTING

I. Voting for the SUSK National Executive will be conducted by secret ballot

2. Voting for the proposed Constitutional Amendments will be conducted by secret ballot

3. Voting for proposed Resolutions will be conducted by show of Delegate voting cards.

4. Counting of votes cast will be conducted by the Congress Elections & Verifications Committee

RESOLUTION

I. The Congress Resolutions Committee shall receive and present the proposed resolutions of the Committees of the Congress.

2. The Resolutions Committee may revise, re-order or amalgamate resolutions in order to;

- Ensure consistency in their format;
- Avoid duplication of similar principles or concepts

3. The Congress Resolutions Committee may also review and propose resolutions not covered by the Committees

4. Each resolution must be proposed by the Congress Resolutions Committee for consideration by the Congress

5. Each Delegate has the right to submit a resolution to the Congress Resolutions Committee in writing.

6. The resolutions may be discussed during the appropriate session within a limited time period specified by the Congress Chair.

7. Any amendments to the resolutions arising from the sessions must be agreed to by either the Chair of the Congress Resolutions Committee or his/her designate.
