UKR 112: Beginners' Ukrainian, II

Courses emphasize oral communication while developing basic listening, reading and writing skills. Cultural practices are taught as an integral part of the language. Not open to students with credit in Ukrainian 30.

UKR 212: The Ukrainian Speaking World, II

Grammar, vocabulary building, reading and writing, conversation. Various media, including the Internet, expose students to contemporary culture and serve as the basis for exercises and student presentations.

UKR 304: Ukrainian in Context, II (Prof. Alla Nedashkivska)

Emphasis on conversation and writing. Films, news items, short stories and plays illustrate grammar, develop practical vocabulary, and serve as a basis for compositions and discussions.

UKR 475 / 575: Ukrainian Literature Today (Prof. Natalia Pylypiuk)

Literary cabarets, irreverent festivals, underground magazines in the wake of Communism's collapse. A fascinating postmodernist and postcolonial mélange of writings that fuses elements of the carnivalesque, the gothic and grotesque, high culture and low culture, the erotic, the serious and the playful. Emphasis is on the youngest and most innovative generation of writers. Internet publications, films and "video poetry." All readings are available in English translation, in addition to the original Ukrainian.
